Solemnity of Christ the King

• Ezekiel 34:11-12, 15-17 • Psalm 23 • 1 Corinthians 15:20-26, 28 • Matthew 25:31-46 •

In today's readings we are invited to reflect on the image of Christ – our King. This may evoke different ideas for us. For some, it reminds us of a story we read in our childhood, while for others it brings to mind their study of kings of a past historical era. The idea of a king may seem paradoxical given our society's emphasis on equality. Yet the idea of someone with the ability to rise above, who can grant special favours, is also a part of this idea.

Imagine a king so capable of granting gifts and requests that other kings seek him out. A king of kings ready to answer our deepest desires. While holding this image in mind, consider the words of Christ the King in the Gospel today. "Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world." Is it possible that through these words he is granting us a favour we are seeking in the form of an answer to these deepest desires?

Today, let us reflect on Christ as our king. Jesus rises above the everyday and is capable of granting us special favours – if only we have the courage to approach the throne of God and ask for what we want.

Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

The last Sunday of the season is reserved for marking Christ's title as King of the Universe (26th November). The political campaigns of the year are mostly ended, the debates of government still wage



on, and people everywhere disagree about affairs of state, but today we acknowledge that all of that means nothing unless we look to the face of God and rely on the Lord's strength and dominion over all to bring us home rejoicing. As with every solemnity, but specifically with those that fall on Sunday, there should be a marked difference – a heightened sense of importance – in these celebrations (for example, additional candles at the altar, more festive vestments, paraments, the use of incense, a sung Gospel, etc.) **How will our parishes honour Christ the King?**

Catechesis About Liturgy

End/beginning of the liturgical year: The liturgical year concludes at the end of this Thirty-Fourth Week in Ordinary Time, the Solemnity of Christ the King. The motif of Christ's Second Coming which we have been focusing on especially these last weeks of the Liturgical Year comes to a climax as we celebrate Christ's victory and coming to glory on the solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ the King. But celebrating the victorious Christ does not end with this liturgical year nor with this solemnity. An eschatological motif continues into the first part of Advent which begins, not with looking to Christ's first coming, but with looking to Christ's second coming. In this way the liturgical year presents to us a seamless rhythm of passion and victory, death and new life. The liturgical year constantly presents to us the most positive motivation to remain faithful to the demands of discipleship throughout the year: we participate in a never-ending rhythm of dying to self and rising to new life.
